I also extend sincere thanks to our auxiliary staff for their invaluable hard work throughout the term.

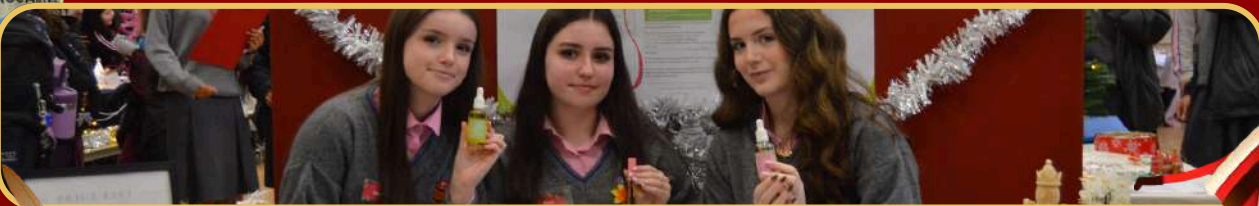

Ember Faith Leaders

Thirteen of our Fifth Year students are leading the Ember Faith Leadership Programme in our school this year. The initial focus of the team is to support the transition of incoming First Year students into the school community.

The team meets on a weekly basis throughout the school year to plan, implement and review activities that promote the Christian spirit of the school.

Students began their work with a three-day leadership training retreat in Ovoca Manor in September. As part of Mercy Week, they led a range of activities including a treasure hunt, supporting RE lessons with First Year students on the history of the school and Catherine McAuley, and organising a walk to the convent in Beaumont Woods.

In October, the students organised Halloween-themed activities for First and Second Years, including a lunchtime film with treats for First Years and Halloween games in advance of the midterm break.

In November, the team was involved in the school's Remembrance Service and Advent services, which took place in the Oratory on Friday mornings leading up to Christmas. They also organised the Christmas Carol Service and decorations for the whole school. In addition, the team ran a very successful fundraiser on Market Day, raising over €450 for St. Francis Hospice.

We extend our sincere thanks to the students involved for the positive impact they continue to make in promoting the Christian spirit of our school.

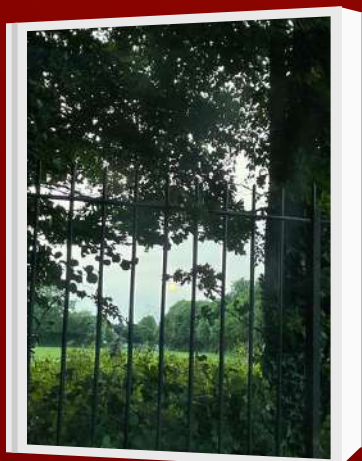

Learning, Leadership and Performance

Model EU Council Debate 2025

The experience developed students' confidence, critical thinking, public speaking and teamwork, while giving them valuable insight into how decision-making operates at EU level.



European Parliament Ambassador Schools Programme – Cross-Border Trip

As part of the European Parliament Ambassador Schools Programme, six TY students travelled to Derry / Londonderry to meet with students from nine other schools across the island of Ireland.

Students worked collaboratively on peacebuilding and reconciliation projects, building meaningful connections and developing a deeper understanding of shared history and citizenship.

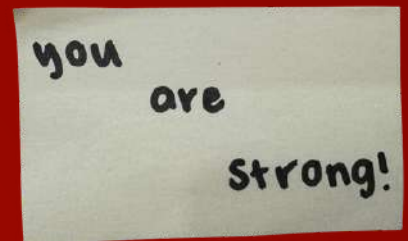
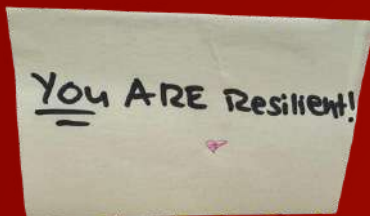


Wellbeing Week 2025
